Bank holidays are holidays when banks and many other businesses are closed for the day. Public holidays are holidays which have been observed through custom and practice. Find out about the bank and public holiday dates and when the clocks go forward and back for British Summer Time.

There are different bank and public holidays in different parts of the UK. There are currently six permanent bank holidays in England and Wales and an additional one in 2012. Christmas Day and Good Friday are public holidays.

The expected bank and public holidays for England and Wales are listed in the table above.

Special bank holidays

There are laws that allow the dates of bank holidays to be changed, or other holidays to be declared, for example to celebrate special

There is a a special bank holiday in 2012 to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. The 2012 late May bank holiday has been moved to Monday 4 June 2012 and an additional Jubilee bank holiday will be on Tuesday 5 June 2012.

Substitute days

When the usual date of a bank or public holiday falls on a Saturday or Sunday, a 'substitute day' is given, normally the following Monday. For example in 2009, Boxing Day was on Saturday, 26 December, so there was a substitute bank holiday on Monday, 28 December.

Add dates to your calendar: Clock changes in the UK.



In the UK the clocks go forward 1 hour at 1am on the last Sunday in March, and back 1 hour at 2am on the last Sunday in October.

The period when the clocks are 1 hour ahead is called British Summer Time (BST). There's more daylight in the evenings and less in the mornings (sometimes called Daylight Saving Time).

When the clocks go back, the UK is on Greenwich Mean Time (GMT).

Overview

When someone dies there are 3 things you must do in the first few days:

- Get a medical certificate you'll get this from a doctor (GP or at a hospital) and you need one to register the death.
- Register the death within 5 days of the death you'll then get the documents you need for the funeral.
- Arrange the funeral you can use a funeral director or do it yourself.

Sorting out the person's affairs, eg selling their property, can be done later.

Buying charcoal from sustainably managed forests helps prevent deforestation and illegal logging. Look for charcoal with a label proving it is made from sustainable wood. You can find both these labels on sustainable charcoal in high street shops:

- Forest Stewardship Council (FSC)
- Programme for the Endorsement of Forest Certification schemes (PEFC)
- Pressures on the environment

Make your own barbecue

Building your own barbecue is a quick and inexpensive task. All you need is some bricks and a metal grill rack. You could use recycled bricks or concrete slabs, and the grill rack

Car tax (tax disc)

You must tax your vehicle and display a tax disc. To do this online you need to be the registered keeper of the vehicle. You can renew your tax any day from the 5th day of the month it is about to expire.





Other ways to apply

You can pay for your tax disc online or by phone if you:

- are the registered keeper of the vehicle and your name, address and vehicle details are up-to-date with DVLA
- have your V11 reminder letter (V85/1 for heavy goods vehicles (HGVs)) or V5C registration certificate
- · have valid insurance
- have an MOT, Goods Vehicle or Passenger Service Vehicle (PSV) test (if needed) - this must be valid when the tax disc starts
- have a debit or credit card (there's a £2.50 service charge if you use a credit card and no charge if you use a debit card)

You should get your new tax disc in the post within 5 working days.

to the DVLA's Vehicle online service.

You can apply for a new tax disc or, if you intend to take the vehicle off the road, declare Statutory Off Road Notification, known as SORN, directly over the internet.

You can also use the vehicle enquiry service to check what information DVLA holds on its database about a vehicle.

How does it work?


- Tell DVLA the vehicle. You will need either the 16 digit reference number shown on your renewal reminder, or the 11 digit reference number from your registration document or certificate (also known as the Logbook) and your vehicle registration mark (number plate).
- For a new tax disc DVLA checks the vehicle is insured and, if applicable has an electronic MOT test
 certificate or GVT certificate or entitlement to disability exemption. How does DVLA check Insurance,
 electronic MOT test certificates and GVT certificates?
- You choose the tax disc you want, 6 or 12 months, and then enter your payment card details. Note: an additional charge of £2.50 will be added to the amount payable if you use a credit card. Why is there an additional charge on credit cards?
- You should receive the new tax disc in the post within 5 working days. If you provide a valid email address
 we will send an email to confirm your tax/SORN transaction. Which address are they sent to?
- Payments will be processed in line with the terms and conditions as stated.



Arranging maintenance with your husband, wife or civil partner

Most couples who are ending a marriage or civil partnership manage to agree between themselves about money without going to court.

If you both agree to financial support, this is known as a 'voluntary agreement'. It can be a written or verbal agreement.

If you want to make your agreement legally binding, you'll need to apply to court for a 'consent order'. A judge will check that the agreement is fair and reasonable. If it is, the judge will approve it to make it legally binding.

The most basic opera†tion of httperf is to generate a fixed number of HTTP GET requests and to measure how many replies (responses) came back from the server and at what rate the responses arrived.

IMPORTANT: To obtain correct results, it is necessary to run at most one httperf process per client machine. Also, there should be as few background processes as possible both on the client and server machines.
